

North Warwickshire – East

North Warwickshire – East is characterised predominantly by a mainly young and middle aged population. The population is fairly evenly distributed between the ages of 0 – 70, with a slight increase in those aged between 35 – 55. Almost 88% of the population is aged below 70. The population density in this locality is 6.8 persons/hectare. The proportion of the population who belong to an ethnic group which is not 'White UK' is very low in this locality, at 4.1% it is almost a third of the Warwickshire average of 11.5%. There is a high proportion of households in which all of the residents speak English as their main language, at 98.4%, it is higher than the Warwickshire and national average.

There are a total of 6,386 occupied households in the locality, of which 24.7% are detached homes, 33.3% are semi-detached homes, 27.1% are terraced homes and 10.5% of homes are within purpose built blocks of flats. The proportion of terraced homes is slightly higher than the Warwickshire average of 22.9%. The proportion of households which are either owned outright or mortgaged is slightly lower, at 65%, than the Warwickshire average of 70%. 15.2% of the households in this locality are rented from the local authority and a further 11.9% are privately rented. The level of income deprivation is higher, at 14.2%, than the county average and slightly lower than the national average. The level of child poverty, 19.9%, is also much higher than the county figure. The proportion of older people in deprivation is higher, at 18.6%, than both the county level and national figures. The percentage of pupils from the area who achieved at least 5 A* - C's in their GCSE's is much lower than both the Warwickshire and national averages. The proportion of the population who are unemployed and the long term unemployment rate are both higher than the Warwickshire figures and similar to the national figures.

The proportion of the population which describes their health as being bad or very bad is higher than both the county and national figures. The proportion of the population who suffer from a long-term illness or disability is also higher than both the county and national figures. The proportions of the population who provide unpaid care for at least 1 hour per week and those who provide at least 50 hours are both higher than the Warwickshire averages and the national averages. The proportion of adults who are obese is much higher, at 30.7%, than the Warwickshire and national figures. In relation to this, the proportion of those who eat healthily is much lower, at 22.1%, than both the Warwickshire and national figures.

Standardised ratios compare the actual rate with the expected rate, adjusting for age and sex. The standardised ratios have been calculated with the England value as the reference value, therefore it is inappropriate to directly compare the locality figures with the Warwickshire figures. The standardised admissions ratio (SAR) for all causes is lower, at 85.2, than the national figure. The SARs for heart attack and COPD are higher than the national figure. The SAR for self-harm suggest emergency admissions for self-harm were higher than expected. The standardised incidence ratios (SIR) are all low for all forms of cancer, except breast cancer which is close to the national figure. The standardised mortality ratios (SMR) for all-cause mortality and all disease specific SMRs are higher in this locality than the national figures. The SMRs for all cause premature mortality are also high, suggesting there was more premature mortality than expected.

The most important factors identified by local residents in making an area a good place to live, and the elements most in need of improvement are typical of the Warwickshire-wide response.

Overall, only 84.4% of the local population are satisfied with North Warwickshire – East as a place to live.
