

## Wellesbourne & Kineton

Wellesbourne & Kineton are characterised predominantly by a largely middle aged population, with a slightly high number of people under the age of 20. Around half of the population are aged between 35 and 70 and 22.3% are below the age of 20. The population density of the locality is quite low at 0.9 persons per hectare. The proportion of the population that is not of a 'White UK' ethnicity is also quite low in this locality with only 4.9% of the population belonging to a 'Black & Minority Ethnic' or 'Other White not UK' group. The proportion of households in which all of the residents speak English as their main language is higher, at 97.9%, than the Warwickshire and national figures.

The locality is comprised of 6,771 household spaces, of which 96.3% are occupied. Of these household spaces 41.6% were detached properties, 30.9% were semi-detached and 21.2% were terraced. The proportion of detached properties in this locality is well above the Warwickshire figure of 28.1%. The proportion of households which are either owned outright or mortgaged is slightly higher, at 70.6%, in this locality than the Warwickshire average, with a difference of 0.6 percentage points. The average number of bedrooms in each home in this locality is higher, at 3.18, than the Warwickshire and national average. The proportion of the population living in income deprivation is lower, at 7.3, in this locality than the Warwickshire and national averages. The proportions of children in poverty and older people living in poverty are also lower in this region than the Warwickshire averages. The percentage of the pupils from the area who achieved 5 or more A\* - Cs in their GCSEs is slightly higher, at 62.7%, than the Warwickshire average. The proportion of the population who are unemployed and the rate of long-term unemployment are also considerably lower than the Warwickshire and national figures.

The proportion of the population that described their general health as being bad or very bad is slightly lower, at 4.2%, in this locality than the Warwickshire average, differing by 0.7 percentage points. The proportion of the population suffering from a long-term illness or disability is also slightly lower, 16.5%, than the Warwickshire average. The proportion of the population that provide at least one hour of unpaid care per week is higher, at 12%, than the Warwickshire and national figures. Whereas, the proportion of the population that provide more than 50 hours of unpaid care per week is identical to the Warwickshire average of 2.3%. The proportion of homes that are overcrowded in this locality is low, at 2.5%, is just over half the Warwickshire average. The proportion of adults who are obese is lower, at 22.8%, than the Warwickshire average. In relation to this, the proportion of adults who eat healthily is higher, at 33.5%, than the Warwickshire and national figures.

*Standardised ratios compare the actual rate with the expected rate, adjusting for age and sex. The standardised ratios have been calculated with the England value as the reference value, therefore it is inappropriate to directly compare the locality figures with the Warwickshire figures.* The standardised admission ratio (SAR) for all causes and all disease specific causes of emergency hospital admission are lower in this locality than the national figures. The SARs for emergency admissions for hip fractures in over 65's and elective hip and knee replacements are higher than the national figures. The standardised incidence ratios (SIR) for all cancer and all specific cancers are quite low in comparison to the national figures, except for breast cancer. The SIR for breast cancer suggests the incidence was considerably higher than expected. The standardised mortality ratios (SMR) for all causes of mortality and premature mortality are quite low. The only disease specific SMR which is higher than the national average is for stroke caused mortality, which is 100.7 in this locality.

The most important factors identified by local residents in making an area a good place to live, and the elements most in need of improvement are typical of the Warwickshire-wide response. The biggest problems in this locality were identified as being problems with residential parking and noise from traffic. Around three quarters of the population reported to being worried about having their homes broken into.

Overall, 90.3% of the population of Wellesbourne and Kineton are satisfied with the local area as a place to live.
